Rotary Opportunity Warehouse

32 Volunteers cover 6 hours x 7 days/week (10am – 4pm). Additionally 8am - 10am for cleaning, sorting, etc. 5 of these volunteers work 8 hour shifts, the majority of the remainder vary between 2 hours and 5.5 hours

- \$5,000+ worth of goods in kind donated to families in need through local agencies and Our Village
- Net income \$142,000 raised to donate to local and national causes

Rotary Op Shop

24 Volunteers cover the 6 hours each weekday when the Op Shop is open. 75% of these wonderful people work one x 3 hour shift per week and 25% work 2 x 3 hour shifts per week.

- People supported. Community cohesion promoted. Rotary's presence visible at shopping centre
- Net surplus \$12,000 raised and donated to local and national causes

President's *review*

Enhancing Participant Engagement

It is no secret that a great 'member experience' is key to retaining members as well as engaging new members. With growing our membership a major goal for the year, our **speaker program** was a high priority in 2023–2024. The planned program was aimed at speakers in four main categories:

- (1) **Expanding our reach and building local relationships** – learning more from local people and organisations to build our local knowledge and networks, as well as being seen as Rotary at work. Reaching out to other Rotary clubs too, we welcomed Dromana and Mount Martha to Club meetings, and worked with Sorrento on two projects.
- (2) **Keeping informed and relevant** – Keeping up with the latest and learning through presentations by our representatives at the Local, State and Commonwealth levels of government.
- (3) **Monitoring our impact** – Checking are we making a difference? – reports from organisations that have received our support – as well as those who seek our support.

- (4) **General Interest** e.g. tackling homelessness, pro bono legal support availability, mechanical beach cleaning – and a few wild cards like handling the 3D generated body parts created to help anatomy students in Africa learn their craft, or Pat's hilarious reminiscences on his recruiting practices for RC Rye during at the 45 year anniversary evening.

To help build members' knowledge about Rotary, a comprehensive **Induction Handbook** was written and distributed to all members.

Expanding Our Reach

Another feature has been our championing of the Peninsula Rotaract 2.0 Club, officially re-founded on 27 April 2024. Lily Setnik, a Club-sponsored RYLA participant, returned inspired to re-create the club and has been the driving force; we have been proud to provide support in various ways.

Sponsorships. We continued Platinum Sponsorship of the Peninsula Film Festival. Thanks to Philip Hedley and Libby Wilson for speaking on our behalf during the Festival. We also added the Rye Junior Gift to our sponsorships this year and thank Neil Stitt for representing us at this event.

Expanding our reach includes the Environment and we continue support the Peninsula Trail development. Thanks to Gordon Hollonds, Environment Director who resigned as a Director but keeps us up to date with developments..

Increasing our Ability to Adapt

Venturing into the Diversity, Equity and Inclusion space, we welcomed local Gurindjii woman Deb Mellett to speak at a Club meeting.

We negotiated the introduction of an Acknowledgement of Country and of those who have gone before us, which is used on occasion.

Increasing our Impact

Knowledge gained from two previous community consultations (a) youth and (b) community has continued to inform our work, and help us gain maximum return on effort and investment. See the impact of our work elsewhere in this report.

Youth *report*

Congratulations to the Youth Team of Neil Stitt, Jo McPherson, Libby Wilson, and Claire Burns on another big – and highly successful – year.

Building on our long history of supporting young people, our local relationships with the five local primary schools have strengthened – Rosebud, Rye, Eastbourne, Tootgarook, Boneo, as well as with Rosebud Secondary College.

Each primary school was invited to share their priorities with some schools opting to retain the end of year Awards program and others opting for other support such as purchasing science equipment at Eastbourne, supporting seven Rye students to attend camp, and purchasing literacy support software for a program at Tootgarook.

Our partnership with Rosebud Secondary College deepened and our investment in disengaged students involved in the BEAM (Belonging Engagement and Meaning) program has continued for a second year. And the impact of this investment? Outcomes reported at a Club meeting by the BEAM Coordinator:

- Student independence to turn up to the weekly mentor sessions
- Excellent attendance at sessions
- Positive student engagement; also classroom teachers have noticed this positive engagement transferring to class in many instances
- Mentors expressed a sense of purpose and appreciate being involved

Assisted by three District Grants, we were once again able to fund three Hardship Scholarships for Rosebud Secondary College students in need.

Two students were sponsored to attend the National Youth Science Forum, and others to attend the Science Experience for Years 10/11 students.

Two senior students acted as the 'Myanmar delegation' to Rotary District 9815 MUNA (Model United Nations Assembly).

Funding was also provided towards a BASE Camp for neuro-diverse students unable to attend regular camps, the World Challenge expedition 2024–25 year to Cambodia and Vietnam as a community service/leadership/personal challenge program and new science equipment.

Our partnership with Young Change Agents, who received Victorian Government funding of \$143,000 continued, and through this endeavour 900 primary and secondary students have been positively impacted over the past two years.

We supported RC Sorrento's Musical Enrichment Program, acting as chaperones for 130 primary school students and teachers from 7 local primary schools on a trip to Hamer Hall to participate in an interactive performance of the Melbourne Symphony Orchestra's Classic Kids program – The Peasant Prince.

International *report*

Sandra Fiedeldy, International Director

It was a very exciting year for International, with lots of ups and downs and a lot of learning for its Director! As happens when you look back at the monthly reports, you get to see how persistence pays off and the impact that Rotary makes outside our home country.

The year started with me being in Nepal, so a fitting place to understand the real needs of local people and the opportunities for Rotary, both for our club and partner clubs RC Mahaboudha, RC Patan and RC Kathmandu Mid-Town.

After sharing the idea for a sustainable garden at KOSHISH, a local mental health facility, RC Patan suggested we apply for a District grant. Disappointingly, we were unable to find support from the other clubs. It was a steep learning curve that led to looking for alternative pathways that would resonate with the other clubs. And so, the germ of an idea emerged ... to accompany Rotaractors to Nepal, so they could experience Rotary in action internationally. Unsurprisingly, it didn't take much convincing Lily Setnik and her friends who had been working to refound the Peninsula 2 Rotaract Club. They were in!

Over the year, the idea developed to include a partnership opportunity with TIO (a major eye hospital in Kathmandu which has a long connection with The Fred Hollows Foundation). Our club agreed to contribute to the printing of an activity book for child eye patients there. And after many conversations, our Rotaractors will now participate in a health camp with TIO doctors and alongside Rotaractors from the RC Mahaboudha. We also received a request from the RC Kathmandu Mid-Town to paint a mural based on Rotary's 7 Areas of Focus at a local school. *(Trip to Nepal November 2024)*

These will be life-changing experiences for our Rotaractors, with projects designed to inspire and grow Rotaract throughout the whole of District 9815 and at the same time, send a clear message to the broader community that Rotary is for all ages.

And that's not all for this incredible year!

One of the ways we supported End Polio Now was by attending the annual Movie Night, organised by RC Dromana. Those who attended were all deeply moved by the biographical story of Robin Cavendish who became paralysed from the neck down by polio at the age of 28 in the late 1950's.

Another inspiring cause we supported was through attending the Interplast Dinner organised by RC Dromana, which led us to contribute towards scholarships for local nurses. Interplast provides life changing plastic and reconstructive surgery – so it was a no-brainer to support them.

We also supported the Rotary Foundation, Rotary International End Polio Fund, Rotarians Against Malaria World Fund (RAM), and the Morocco flood relief fund.

Just saying..... we can be very proud to call ourselves Rotarians.

The Peninsula Film Festival has gone from strength to strength and we were able to be closely involved as a Major Sponsor, as well as speaking at two of the events.

Finally, this report would not be complete without mentioning the Food Van - which has been a source of fun, friendship - and fundraising - and Rotary being seen out and about in the community.

It was a sad day when it became clear that it was no longer viable for the old and trusty Land Cruiser to be repaired again, and so it was sold. This effectively meant that the Food Van was no longer able to be used, except for special occasions when other towing vehicles could be found. The decision has subsequently been made to sell the Food Van also.
